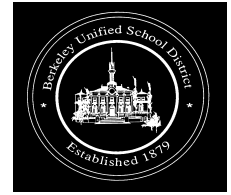

To the Parents/Guardians at Rosa Parks Elementary School:

The purpose of this letter is to inform you that our school continues to be identified as a Program Improvement (PI) school under the federal No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act of 2001. It is now a PI Year 5 school.

What is PI?

NCLB requires the state and district to review annually the academic progress of federally funded Title I schools and to identify schools in need of improvement. These schools are identified as PI schools after two consecutive years of not making adequate yearly progress (AYP). California determines AYP by considering the following four measures:

- The percentage of students scoring at the "proficient" or "advanced" level on the California Standards Tests for English-language arts and mathematics
- The percentage of students participating in those tests
- The graduation rate for high schools
- California's own accountability measurement of progress, the Academic Performance Index (API)

Why is our school identified as PI?

The reason our school continues in PI is because it did not achieve Adequate Yearly Progress in 2007-08. The area(s) that caused the identification are: In English Language Arts and Mathematics the percent proficient fell below target for one subgroup.

Public school choice: What right does a parent have to request a transfer to a school that is not in PI?

All parents/guardians of students attending a PI school in Year 1 or greater have the right to request a transfer of their child(ren) to a non-PI school that is identified by the district. Because of our limitations based on facilities we are working with neighboring districts to identify these schools of choice. Once identified parents who select the school choice option the district will provide a form of transportation for the student. Limitations exist on the amount of funding available for transportation and should the demand for transportation necessary to provide school choice exceed funds available, priority will be given to lowest achieving, low-income students.

Supplemental educational services (SES): What is it and who is eligible?

SES is *not* available for PI schools in Year 1. However, students from low-income families at PI schools in Year 2 or greater whose parents did not select a public school choice option are eligible for free SES. These services are classes or tutoring which occur outside the regular school day with educational providers approved by the State Board of Education. If the number of eligible students who apply for the SES program exceeds the financial resources available, the lowest achieving students from low-income families will receive SES first. All eligible families will receive an application packet including a list of eligible providers in the next few days.
